there are several reasons why the chronicle is particularly suited as the topic of a yearbook in the first place there is its ubiquity all over europe and throughout the middle ages chronicles were written both in latin and in the vernacular and not only in europe but also in the countries neighbouring on it like those of the arabic world secondly all chronicles raise such questions as by whom for whom or for what purpose were they written how do they reconstruct the past what determined the choice of verse or prose or what kind of literary influences are discernable in them finally many chronicles have been beautifully illuminated and the relation between text and image leads to a wholly different set of questions the yearbook the medieval chronicle aims to provide a representative survey of the on going research in the field of chronicle studies illustrated by examples from specific chronicles from a wide variety of countries periods and cultural backgrounds the medieval chronicle is published in cooperation with the medieval chronicle society

the papers collected in this volume focus on the sources for reconstructing the history of the third to fifth centuries ad the first section historiography looks at a small group of chronicles and breviaria whose texts are fundamental for our reconstruction of the history of the third and fourth centuries some well known others much less so eusebius of caesarea jerome the lost kaisergeschichte and eutropius in this section the goal in each case is a specific attempt to come to a better understanding of the structure composition date or author of these historical texts the second section history presents a group of historical studies ranging in time from the death of constantine in 337 to the vicennalia of anastasius in 511 in these papers the keys to the conclusions offered arise from a better understanding of the literary sources particularly chronicles and consularia an understanding of the evolution of historical accounts over time or the employment of sources that are either new or unusual in these particular contexts consular fasti coins papyri and itineraries

this book examines for the first time the scriptorium of the augustinian monastery of st pancras in hamersleben in the last quarter of the 12th century six wellknown manuscripts were produced there of the fourteen scribeartists involved one in particular stands out as responsible for the correct text and illustrations the bold innovations of this master scribeartist are expressed especially in the decoration programmes of a psalter and two gospel books the manuscripts produced in the hamersleben scriptorium as well as its notable library were dispersed throughout the world or thought to be lost in this book six known manuscripts are brought home to hamersleben each manuscript is minutely analysed for its codicology palaeography text and illuminations the style of script as well as the style and iconography of the illustrations are discussed in relation to those from other monasteries in saxony in order to examine the evolvement of the regional style

offers insights into sources and inspirations authorship and authorial style and patterns of separation and convergence across versions of the anglo saxon chronicles the anglo saxon chronicle is one of the most important documents to survive from early medieval england written in old english it was first created during the reign of king alfred the great 871 899 up to alfred s reign and then in multiple continuations extending into the twelfth century the chronicle versions often provide a unique record of events at times reported in the barest style at others with passionate commentary this book is the first to tell the story of how the chronicles came to be providing a clear but detailed account of the development of its various versions it starts with an examination of the textual and manuscript evidence then explores the work of the two chroniclers first responsible for the anglo saxon chronicle s creation in the late ninth century arguing that the first made a set of annals from disparate sources the author then contends that a later reviser aligned with the alfredian political programme wrote the annals for alfred s reign

and at the same time also revised earlier entries including the famous story of cynewulf and cyneheard this book also sheds new light on the annals of Æthelred the unready arguing that archbishop wulfstan of york is likely to have authored some these together with some tenth century annals its final chapter provides the first comprehensive study of all the chronicles poetry

this is the 7th edition of the original aramaic peshitta new testament in plain english aramaic was the language of the jewish people in israel and throughout the middle east and in europe from the time of their captivity in babylon in the 6th century bc and afterward until the muslim conquests of the 7th century ad the peshitta is the original aramaic new testament as the author demonstrates in the hundreds of notes throughout this edition from matthew to revelation showing how the greek nt is a translation of the peshitta s aramaic readings and sometimes a mistranslation or several greek translations resulted from one aramaic reading the original nt was written by jewish men for the most part to jewish converts of yeshua the messiah who were the first and founding members of the churches paul the apostle evangelized throughout the roman world of the 1st century paul always went to the synagogues in any city or town and preached yeshua the messiah as the son of god and the lord 8x11 paperback

scholars have long accepted the belief that a theravada buddhist mon kingdom r ma adesa flourished in coastal lower burma until it was conquered in 1057 by king aniruddha of pagan which then became in essence the new custodian and repository of mon culture in the upper burmese interior this scenario which aung thwin calls the mon paradigm has circumscribed much of the scholarship on early burma and significantly shaped the history of southeast asia for more than a century now in a masterful reassessment of burmese history michael aung thwin reexamines the original contemporary accounts and sources without finding any evidence of an early theravada mon polity or a conquest by aniruddha the paradigm he finds cannot be sustained how when and why did the mon paradigm emerge aung thwin meticulously traces the paradigm s creation to the merging of two temporally causally and contextually unrelated mon and burmese narratives which were later synthesized in english by colonial officials and scholars thus there was no single originating source only a late and mistaken conflation of sources the conceptual methodological and empirical ramifications of these findings are significant the prevalent view that state formation began in the maritime regions of southeast asia with trade and commerce rather than in the interior with agriculture must now be reassessed in addition a more rigorous look at the actual scope and impact of a romanticized mon culture in the region is required other issues important to the field of early burma and southeast asian studies including the process of indianization the characterization of classical states and the advent and spread of theravada buddhism are also directly affected by aung thwin s work finally it provides a geo political cultural and economic alternative to what has become an ethnic interpretation of burma s history an electronic version of this book is freely available thanks to the support of libraries working with knowledge unlatched a collaborative initiative designed to make high quality books open access for the public good the open access
